

### *Licensure Status of Our Graduates*

The Clinical Psychology Program at the University of Miami prepares students for professional clinical activities. It is our experience that all of our graduates who are required to obtain state licensure as a psychologist for their employment have done so successfully.

The model of training for the Clinical Psychology Program at the University of Miami is that of the Scientist-Practitioner, with a greater emphasis on the clinical science end of the continuum. As a result, many of our graduates develop careers in research that may not require licensure as a psychologist (e.g., professor at a research university; full time employment in a research setting), although many of these graduates still seek and obtain licensure. A small proportion of our graduates have continued their careers abroad, where there are no formal licensing laws or provisions, or have delayed their career plans due to family or other personal issues. The data presented below should be viewed in this context.
