The faculty and staff of the Psychology Department welcome you to the new academic year and all it has to offer! We hope your summer has given you a change of pace that will help prepare you for the challenges that the new academic year brings. In order to accommodate increased demand for psychology courses, more variety and more sections of courses have been added this year. In addition, we are planning to work with the Study Abroad Program to increase the number of overseas experiences available to our majors. Associated with this, Dr. Noriega has issued the "Hello Challenge" to encourage all of you to think about foreign lands and the possibility of learning about new cultures and traditions as part of your UM experience. A big part of current thinking in psychology relates to individual and group differences in how we see the world, how we interact with each other and how we view ourselves and our environment. Psychology and Neuroscience theses constituted a large proportion of all magna and summa Honors Theses completed campus-wide.

PRIME 2007



As part of an effort by the American Psychological Association (APA) and the National Institute of General Medical Sciences (NIGMS) to increase minority representation in areas of biopsychological research and career pipeline, seventeen students were funded to do research this summer. Special matching funds from the Provost allowed some non-minority students to participate in the program, as well.

Participants in the PRIME summer program had the opportunity to work closely with a faculty mentor and other members of the faculty's research laboratory for ten weeks on an individual research project. Students worked a minimum of 20 hours per week on their research and attended weekly meetings with **Dr. Victoria Noriega** and graduate student mentors, **Stephanie Fitzpatrick** and **Ximena Dominquez**. The weekly meetings covered various topics including graduate school and different career paths in psychology. The meetings also served as a forum for students to share their own thoughts and ideas.

The summer was also full of fun activities for the PRIME group. They joined with other research programs on campus and enjoyed trips to the theatre, snorkeling adventures, a visit to Chihuly, movie and pizza nights, and an end of the summer picnic. On July 26, students finalized their posters and presented their research to faculty, friends, and family. We are extremely proud of all their hard work and effort!

Shereen has recently completed her Masters of Professional Accounting at FIU and is now working as a Senior Associate for Pricewaterhousecoopers LLP.

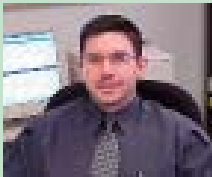
